LAX CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS Terminal 6 Update



In the name of comfort, convenience, and service improvements for Terminal 6 passengers, major state-of-the-art changes were completed in March. Renovations included a Central Service Counter and "Airport of the Future" ticketing lobby with customer-friendly islands of check-in kiosks and bag-check stations.

Expect to see a new in-line, checked-baggage inspection system and additional passenger security screening checkpoints to help streamline the process. Beyond screening, passengers will be greeted by spacious new boarding gate areas, a new airline club lounge, modernized information displays, specialty lighting, and other architectural elements reflecting Alaska Airlines' brand and design.

Behind-the-Scenes Look: Tom Bradley Int'l Terminal

Approaching the halfway mark of construction, LAX invited the media to participate in a "hard hat" walking tour of the construction site of the new Tom Bradley International Terminal. The impressive new terminal will span 1,531 feet and contain 45,000 tons of steel, enough to build five Eiffel Towers.

Among the tour highlights, the financial contributions being made to the local economy was also emphasized due to the \$4.1-billion in construction taking place at LAX. The Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation reported that the new construction has an enormous impact on local employment; creating a

Q: What is the significance of the DC-3 displayed at the Flight Path
Museum and where was the aircraft manufactured?

A: The historic aircraft, DC-3, was the mainstay of civil air transportation in the propeller era before World War II. The museum's DC-3 was manufactured at the Douglas Aircraft Co. plant in Santa Monica in 1941. After many years with Trans World Airlines, it was purchased by the Union Oil Company of California and used to transport the firm's executives. In "retirement," the DC-3 was acquired by the California Science Center and displayed first at Hawthorne Airport before finding a home at Flight Path.
